

Post Easter Letdown?

With the great celebrations of Holy Week and Easter behind us, there is a tendency (at least in those who actually celebrated Holy Week and Easter) to have a bit of a letdown. It is hard to sustain that kind of enthusiasm and spiritual intensity over a long period of time. But the church does try. Easter is a season, not just a day and the celebration goes on until Pentecost (May 11). So the church thinks that Easter is at least a fifty day celebration. The readings and the music of this season continue to remind us of the great event of our salvation in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Since we spent forty days of Lent preparing for Easter, we can spend fifty day celebrating it. Try to remind yourself often of how blessed you are to be who you are in the love that God has shared with you (1 John 3:1). There doesn't need to be the usual post Easter letdown. It's up to you.

Prayer

More than once in the past months I have asked that you pray for our country. There are many reasons for doing so. We have a general election this year during which we will elect a new president, once third of the Senate, and the entire House of Representatives, not to mention the myriad of local elections for just about every office you can imagine. Pray daily that this nation will turn back to God. The last half century has seen a great separating from the Lord and in that separation an extraordinary decline in the nation's moral compass. Even the church has tried to create a new image for itself and in doing so many branches of God's church have gone astray, accommodating themselves to a secular humanist culture that actually sacrifices God on the altar of political correctness.

If that were not enough, the immorality and violence that has overtaken our society at an alarming rate in the past few decades should drive us to our knees. Pornography of every kind is rampant and the internet, which can be a great tool for good, is being used for the spread of evil. Letters to Malcolm submitted by Ellen Stults

<u>Letters to Malcolm</u> is a compilation of essays in the form of correspondence between Clive Staples Lewis and his (presumably fictitious) friend Malcolm. The letters focus on the subject of prayer, specifically when and where and why. This book was published posthumously like many of Lewis' books

Lewis starts with musings on liturgical service content. He said that many churches try to keep drawing people in through novelty at every service. Lewis said that occasionally having something different and maybe unusual in the service was fine, but didn't novelty for the most part distract the worshippers from the main goal of attending church, that is, to worship God? "Novelty," said Lewis, "...simply as such, can have only entertainment value." Lewis believed that a steady, structured service was vital to a Christian's spiritual growth and that God does require Christians to partake in "corporate prayer." Lewis said, "I can make do with almost any kind of service whatever, if only it will stay put."

Lewis next discusses the pros and cons of "ready made" prayers. These are prayers that people write for other people to use. The prayers in the prayer book, for example, are "ready made" prayers. Lewis didn't particularly like to use "ready mades" in his personal prayer life but he said that at the beginning of his Christian walk he tried to pray without words at all. He tried to convey his thoughts and feelings to God through mental images, not words. He realized that this form of prayer is very difficult to put to practice and requires great mental and spiritual strength which he didn't claim to have. Lewis expressed a belief that people each have different ways of communicating to God, so if someone felt they could better express themselves through another persons words, let them have at it!

Lewis asked the question, if God is omniscient why do we give Him information? Lewis answered himself by saying that of course God knows everything about us but there is a very significant difference between being known and offering yourself. When we talk to God and give Him information we are giving our permission to let God know us. God does not need our permission to absorb the knowledge we have, He already has it. God does want us to offer ourselves for His viewing though, and in offering ourselves we offer our knowledge, our mind and outlook.

Lewis discusses many other topics within prayer such as petitionary prayers and prayer as worship and does an adequate job of answering most of his questions. It remains to be seen whether or not his deductions and assumptions are correct but I felt fully satisfied with his answers. This was one of the last of Lewis' books, poems, or essays to be published (published in 1964, Lewis died in 1963. We don't know when the "letters" were written but it is assumed close to the end of his life. They were certainly written after he had rallied from being very ill later in life.) and is proof that Lewis kept his mind and spirituality awake and active to the end.


Rescheduled Meeting
