Advent and Christmas

Advent starts a little early this year and may have already started by the time you receive this. Not to worry. The season of Advent is almost four weeks long this year. We might be able to use a little extra time to contemplate the meaning of the Incarnation in our lives. 2020 has been one of the worst years in memory for a lot of people. I know it has been for Nancy and me. But while the season of Advent is meant to commemorate the longing and waiting for the coming of the Messiah, we need to remember that he has indeed already come. A couple of weeks ago I suggested that you take a look at Bishop Reed's convention address, for not the least of which reasons is the sheer hopefulness of it for the diocese, of course, but for us as individuals as well. Over and over again he said, "Have courage, don't be afraid." There is evil all around us, but the message of hope never changes for those who believe in Christ as their Lord and Savior. The Advent season is filled with hope but also with a caution. Stay on the narrow path. Keep your eyes fixed on Jesus in everything. Our salvation rests in nothing on this earth but on Him. That is meditation for a hundred Advents.

Our Christmas Eve and Christmas Day liturgies this year will be only slightly different. On Christmas Eve we will have our traditional Lessons and Carols followed by Holy Communion beginning at 8:00 pm. We will not have a pre-service music program this year due to a number of extenuating circumstances. But the service itself is a magnificent Anglican tradition and everyone is usually pleased to be

able to celebrate it. On Christmas morning we will have a Holy Communion service with music starting at 10:00 am. As usual, these will be our only Christmas liturgies. I know that some of you are still worried about the virus and will probably not attempt coming to either one of the services. I understand. Unfortunately we will be unable to live stream these services this year due to the fact that our audio-visual team and our musicians are virtually the same people. They just haven't mastered the art of bi-location yet. I will not encourage you to take any risk with which you are uncomfortable. But if you can make it, I believe that you will enjoy worshipping together this year.

Other Tidbits

The pledge drive continues through Sunday, December 6, and I would ask that you have your pledge cards in by that date. Obviously, we won't refuse them after that. But we need to start making a budget for next year and the more pledges we have in by that time, the more realistic our proposed budget will look for next year.

I also want to thank all of you who participated in this year's Operation Christmas Child and the Adopt a Family program through Trotter House (formerly Austin Pregnancy Resource Center). What you donate to these organizations, and through them to some very needy people, has an immeasurable impact in their lives.

Finally, let me say this as we close out 2020. I am grateful to everyone who has shouldered the burden of keeping St. Francis up and running

during this crazy year. Many people who already do a lot have taken on even more without counting the cost. For those of you who have chosen to come and worship in person, I am especially grateful. You have no idea how it lifts

me when I am celebrating and preaching. Let's pray that 2021 will be a year of blessing from the Lord.

2020: WHERE IS OUR HOPE?



This year has been full of tension, uncertainty, and grief. We are quick to take sides, judge others who have different opinions, call them out publicly and make our voice heard, and call others to action. Our world is divided in a lot of ways, but

the one thing we can all agree on is this: *We're hurting*. I don't have answers to all the injustices and problems that exist today, but I have the answer to the biggest question a lot of us are asking, "Where is our hope?"

When chatting with a friend earlier this month, I was reminded that our hope has to be in Jesus—that's it. There's so much that 2020 has taught me, and the biggest thing is that there is absolutely nothing I actually control or have power over. Nothing. My hope has to be in the One Who has the power because without Him, I have nothing. The things I do are useless. *The things I put my hope in are useless*. Without Jesus, I really am just dust.

Although this season has been tough, Jesus has reminded me very sweetly that He has watched over my journey through the wilderness, time and time again. And in all of it, He has and will be glorified – and because I am His child, eventually, so will I. That's a promise I've been clinging to in this season.

When I think of how God answers prayers, the big three often comes to mind: yes, no, and wait. However, I am learning this view of God's answers to prayer can be narrow, as it only focuses on God's answers to our prayer requests of Him.

What if our approach to prayer was in alignment with our relationship with Him, the Giver of the gifts, and not the gifts themselves? As we enter into deeper and broader communion with Him, wouldn't we love to see God's answers to our prayers in a more expansive, less limited way? I believe that that's where real change has the potential to happen—in our hearts. When we surrender all of our prayers to God and let the Holy Spirit intercede in them, change is inevitable.

The thing so many of us are calling for and demanding—change—is only possible through the Holy Spirit and prayer. And yet, I've heard so many criticisms of the Church, saying that "we can't just pray," or "we have to do something".

I agree that we do have to do more—faith without works is dead, after all. However, the word "just" should never be put in front of the word "pray."

Prayer is where all of our hope is found. So keep praying. Keep interceding. Keep asking for change in the Name of Jesus. It will happen. Prayer is powerful. Don't let anybody tell you differently.

At Christmas time each year, St. Francis adopts a family from the Trotter house, a community outreach assisting women and families in an unplanned pregnancy and beyond (formerly, the Austin Pregnancy Resource Center). This year we are helping a family of five: Mayra has four children between the ages of 15 months and 9 years old. Donations are being accepted to purchase two gifts per child with the extra going towards a gift card for the family. 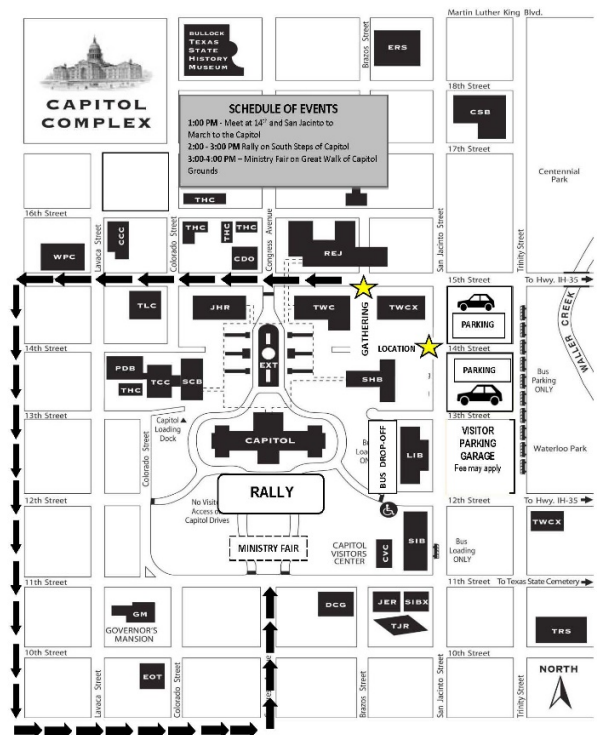
PLEDGES ARE DUE
