FROM OUR RECTOR

I would like to make explicit what was implicit in September and October's Parish Newsletters as it relates to our Collects and Lessons throughout the liturgical year. As is well-known among you, our parish holds to and utilizes the 1928 Book of Common Prayer. This has been primarily evidenced in and through our service of <u>Holy Communion</u>. What has not been used is the weekly lectionary of our prayer book (that is, the epistle and gospel lessons).

With the advent of Advent and the beginning of a new liturgical year, our parish will not only continue following the weekly collects but also the weekly epistle and gospel lessons found in our Prayer Book. This is being done in consultation with Bishop Reed, as well as our vestry as we seek to continue to more fully embrace our Prayer Book. Robert Crouse (a noted Anglican pastor and theologian) has this to say regarding the lectionary of the 1928 Prayer Book:

In the cycle of the Christian Year, in the ancient lectionary - that cycle of Epistle and Gospel lessons which has served the Church for well over a millennium, and still survives in our Book of Common Prayer - the essential message of Holy Scripture, God's word to us, is set before us in an orderly and supremely logical way. As we follow the lessons appointed for the Sundays and the great festivals, as we meditate upon them, as we open our minds and hearts to understand the pattern and meaning of them, we are led, step by step, into an ever deeper and clearer perception of Christian truth and the essentials of Christian life.

In addition, on the second Sunday of each month, we will be saying Morning Prayer and Holy Communion together in one service. This is made possible by following the rubrics found within our Prayer Book – that is, it is nothing new but rather something ancient. It had been the custom of our parish to say Morning Prayer with Holy Communion once a month, however, this discipline was stopped during the covid years. By reintroducing Morning Prayer with Holy Communion, my hope is that it will help reinforce the disciplined use of the Daily Offices in our homes throughout the week.

Using our Prayer Book lectionary, along with the Daily Offices and Adult Sunday School, enables us together as a parish to be fully immersed in the reading and study of God's Holy Word from Genesis through Revelation. And in doing so, we will continue to plunge the depths of the riches of Christ as we worship and glorify Him both now and forever.

CHRISTMAS POINSETTIAS

For the duration of Advent from the 3rd through the 24th, there will be no flowers on the altar. This bareness will be in strong contrast with the 12 days of Christmas and Epiphany when the altar and the entire church will be beautifully decorated with flowers and poinsettias. If you wish to make a donation for the poinsettias as a remembrance, memorial, or thank offering, please use an envelope from the table in the Narthex to enclose your donation. Fill the envelope front out as appropriate and place it in the basket on the same table.

INCREASED USE OF MORNING AND EVENING PRAYER

To encourage the use of morning and evening prayer in your home and at church, all should be aware of the following resources:

- The Cradle of Prayer (https://cradleofprayer.org/) offers recordings for morning and evening prayers and free daily downloads, read directly from the pages of 1928 Book of Common Prayer. The hope is these readings and songs refresh your mind, heart, and soul as you walk in the path of our Lord together. You are welcomed to participate as you listen, where you might find yourself in a prayerful chapel with only your priest and cantor. It's time made for you without the distractions of our world. They provide a written copy of the service as well. Each service is about 15 minutes long.
- Common Prayer (http://commonprayer.org/) is an independent, privately sponsored collection of resources based on the 1928 Book of Common Prayer, especially the Daily Offices of Morning and Evening Prayer. CommonPrayer.org is not affiliated with or sponsored by any parish, diocese, province, or other ecclesiastical body; it is a personal ministry offered as a gift to those who love the 1928 BCP and traditional Anglican liturgy. They offer a place of prayer and peace to all, with no politics or agendas.
- Of course, you are welcome to have your own service. The lessons appointed for each day begin on page x of the prayer book, with the Morning Prayer liturgy beginning on page 3 and Evening Prayer on page 21.
- You are welcome to come to St. Francis Evening Prayer on Thursdays at 7 pm. Fr. Cappucci leads the 30 minutes service, with Jim Crandell leading the singing of the hymns and canticles and reading the lessons. There is even an option to participate via Zoom. Email infor@stfrancisaustin.org for the link. Up to 15 people are now attending.
